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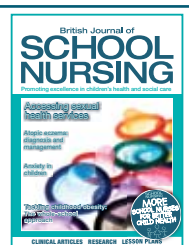

## How to get to the venue

**The Centennial Centre, 100 Icknield Port Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham B16 0AA**

**From M5 Northbound:** Leave the M5 at junction 3 and head towards Birmingham on the A456 for 4 miles. Turn left onto B4124. At next roundabout take first exit onto B4126 (Icknield Port Road) and The Centennial Centre is ½ mile on the left hand side.

**From M6 North & Southbound:** Leave the M6 at junction 6 (Spaghetti Junction) taking the A38(M) Aston Expressway into Birmingham. Follow the signs for the M5 and reach Five Ways island via A456, take the fourth exit A4540. At next roundabout take the second exit onto B4126 (Icknield Port Road) and The Centennial Centre is ½ mile on the left hand side.

There is a free car park at the venue.

**From Fiveways railway station:** Take bus number 11 direct to the venue or 20 minutes walk from the station.
